

## The RAIC releases the Third Edition of the Canadian Handbook of Practice for Architects

**OTTAWA February 25, 2021–** The Royal Architectural Institute of Canada (RAIC) is pleased to announce the release of the new Canadian Handbook of Practice for Architects. Last published in 2009, this third edition is a comprehensive reworking of an essential professional resource which resulted from extensive collaboration by the architectural profession from every region of the country. The new document includes the work of over 45 experts, guided by the architects of an Editorial Board assembled from across Canada. For practicing architects, those working to become architects and others who engage with the architectural profession, the Handbook is an essential instructional resource and reference manual.

Architecture is self-regulating profession in Canada with a mandate that architects practice in a manner which preserves and protects the public interest. Architects require a wide range of professional skills. These include the knowledge and skill to design buildings, a thorough understanding of sound and economical construction, proficiency in the application of business and legal principles, and the ability to motivate, coordinate, and manage a complex network of stakeholders. The architect must be designer, construction expert, manager, and leader. It is anticipated that this new Third Edition of the Canadian Handbook of Practice for Architects will contribute to the advancement and evolution of the practice of architecture - and, consequently, enhance the built environment and architecture in Canada.



Providing many useful checklists and sample documents, the new Handbook contains more than 1,000 pages and is divided into six specific sections:

- Theory and Background
- The Context of Practice
- Management of the Architectural Practice
- The Design-Construction Program
- Management of the Design Project
- Phases of the Design Project

The Handbook is available without cost, on a comprehensive searchable website in both official languages, English and French. As a living document, this resource will be continuously updated and developed over time to reflect the evolution of architectural practice in Canada.
